Dear Friends of Pelican Harbor,

For more than 40 years, Pelican Harbor Seabird Station has served the Pelicans, other species of native wildlife, and communities of Greater Miami and Southern Florida. This past year, in addition to treating over 2,100 new patients, including several threatened species and patients not previously seen at PHSS, we made significant progress on articulating a new, more inclusive vision and strategy for our organization. PHSS is dedicated to the rescue, rehabilitation, and release of sick, injured, or orphaned Brown Pelicans, seabirds and other native wildlife. In our opinion, preserving and protecting these species, as well as educating new generations about them, is key to a responsible and robust human experience on our planet.

In 2021 we also made progress on our exciting journey to build a new and more expansive state-of-the-art facility on a beautiful 2.6-acre property on the bank of Miami's Little River. Plans have been drawn, teams put in place, and we now await zoning approvals with the goal of breaking ground within the next 12 months.

When our new site is complete and open, more patients will be treated and released each year; more students will be educated on the importance of wildlife conservation; our communities will know where to send injured wildlife when they see them on our beaches and in our backyards. Miami and Southern Florida will be better for it.

As you know, we are currently in an inflationary environment that will impact our building costs. Therefore, our refined plans reflect an increase in the target of our capital campaign to \$12,000,000. As of the start of this year, we have raised \$7,125,000 including matching gifts. I would like to thank all of you for your generosity and also remind that there are several naming opportunities still available. Please consider making Pelican Harbor a beneficiary of your generosity in 2022.

I invite you to join us in helping to restore South Florida's biodiversity and assist in healing the world in which we live, work, play, and grow.



Fallen Bald Eaglets Rescued

April 19th, 2021- After a heavy thunderstorm damaged

a local Eagle nest, two eaglets fell over 100 feet to the ground. The first eaglet was quickly rescued, followed by its sibling after an exhaustive two-week search. Both

birds were later transferred for continued care.

Anhinga Saved from Facemask

August 18th, 2021- An adult Anhinga was rescued from a lake in Doral after being found with a cloth face mask tangled in its beak. Luckily, our clinic staff were able to carefully remove the mask and the bird was released six days later!
